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Historical Organ

Submitted by the Rev. Judy Dwyer, Grace Presbyterian Church, Jenkintown

This is a Model 560 Packard Organ, built by the Fort Wayne Organ Company around 1895, which served as the organ for the Hilltown Baptist Church for many years. Judy Dwyer writes, "My father, who was a music educator and church organist/choir director, rescued this instrument from the basement of the old Hilltown Baptist Church in Line Lexington, PA before it was torn down to make way for the new church building. My grandmother used this as her practice instrument as well." Judy's grandfather had been a woodworker and a teacher, and her grandmother had been a crafts person and a musician. Each of their children went on to play instruments, with both the grandmother and Judy's father being organists. The organ initially was moved into the grandparents' home in Perkasie, then into Judy's parents' home, and finally into her home - for around the last 30 years!

Judy goes on to say, "In my lifetime, this organ has worked well. I have fond memories of my dad playing it at Christmastime, with both of his brothers gathered round, one on his violin and the other on his trumpet. At the moment, the organ needs new straps for the pedals and a good cleaning and reconditioning. It was built by the Fort Wayne Organ Company in Fort Wayne, Indiana. It has never had the top piece while owned by my family."

Earlier this year, the great-granddaughter of Emmons Howard (1845–1931) offered the OHS Library and Archives a give of ephemera related to the organ heard at the Pan-American Exposition of 1901. Among the objects in the gift are a descriptive booklet with stop-list, a photo of the organ, and the gold-medal awarded to the organ builder.

Howard was born in Brimfield, Mass., a small town located about 25 miles east of Springfield. Later he took up residence in Westfield, which is located about twenty miles to the west of Springfield. Here, Howard spent most of his life working in the pipe organ trade, first for William Johnson and then for Steere & Turner. In 1898, he acquired the Johnson firm; in turn Emmons Howard & Son was absorbed by E.M. Skinner Organ Co. in 1928. Howard's purchase of the Johnson firm assured him an experienced and stable workforce, and a modern workshop suitable for the construction of large organs.

Located in a recess on one of the eight sides of the Temple of Music at the Buffalo, N.Y. exposition, the


The Pan-American Exposition of 1901 and Its Four-Manual Organ



tubular-pneumatic organ stood 36 feet wide, 20 feet deep, and 44 feet high. The wind system was provided with three large bellows, each with double feeders, powered by Spencer water engines. The double-wall swell boxes and thick shutters produced effective crescendos and diminuendos. Howard's description of the organ states that "the

specification embraces an unusual number of foundation stops, and when these pipes are made from large scales, as in the present instance, a full body of tone without harshness is the result." The four-manual organ (Great, Swell, Choir, Solo, plus Pedal), had 43 voices and 48 ranks. The Pedal had no independent voices.

After the exposition closed in November, the organ was installed in Elmwood Music Hall, Buffalo's prime concert and convention space. In 1938, the organ was put a barn for storage, and less than ten years later, it was sold as scrap for \$165.

The Reuter Organ Company's renovation of the Schultz Memorial Organ at St. John's Church has accomplished several much-needed improvements. The new custom-designed console replaces the failing Aeolian-Skinner console which was installed in 1977. Tonally, the organ's sound has been expanded to fill in the fundamental pitches so necessary for leading congregational singing. In addition to revoicing and repurposing many of the pipes from the 1977 organ, several new ranks of pipes were added. Of particular note is the all-new Principal Chorus on the Great, along with an 8' Tromba that effectively functions as a solo reed as well as a chorus reed. The 16' sound of the organ has been enhanced by new Geigen pipes and an extension to the Oboe rank. Two other new reeds and some new flutes complete the roster of 40 ranks.

The organ chamber was totally redesigned with a new tone opening into the choir loft and totally functional swell shades. The result is an organ whose sound complements the grand architecture of St. John's sanctuary and its colorful stained glass windows.



- 2. The upcoming POE (July 8-13 at Girard College) is in need of volunteers, specifically chaperones and drivers for the students. Please contact Kathleen Scheide (kscheide@rider.edu) and offer to help.
- 3. We saw a sample logo that was the result of many committee meetings and designed by Roy Harker. The Board made some general suggestions and the Communications Team will follow up with Roy.
- 4. Discussion about the discrepancies between our chapter data base (Wild Apricot) and ONCARD. Ongoing work to decide whether to keep Wild Apricot and if so, how to make it "talk" to ONCARD so both are in sync.
- 5. An evaluation of January Jumpstart was distributed. Next year, keynote will likely be an "organ" person, and we may bring back the worship opportunity. Discussion about catering costs and how to best estimate number of lunches needed.


ncorporating instruments into worship music can be a wonderful thing!! Andrew Senn did an excellent presentation during this year's January Jumpstart on just this topic, complete with his trademark wonderful sense of humor. I routinely try to use instruments when they are available and offer here a few ideas.

If you have not already encountered it, the music from the remarkable ecumenical contemplative community in France of Taizé is a wonderful resource. There are choral books of responses, litanies, canons which come with matching books of possible instrumental parts to overlay. If you need something accessible and lovely for your singers, the repeating refrains can be paired with solo verses and overlaid with instruments as available, in as simple or as complex a presentation as you choose!

- You can use an instrumentalist on a descant line as support or instead of voices
- You can double tricky voice parts with competent instruments in the same range for an added measure of vocal safety – I did this with some community choir performances which were shorter on rehearsal time than I'd have liked
- I played for a church where the historic organ had no reeds, so I arranged the Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring choral parts for woodwind quartet to be accompanied by organ the real thing can be a delight!
- You can have an instrumentalist play the solo line of an organ work – for instance I was fortunate enough to have an excellent English Horn player that I arranged to share some Mozart with.
- Bells and instruments can be a lovely combination, accompanying voices or otherwise.



- Is your choir missing key voices? Perhaps instruments in key places will make things work!
- Encouraging young people to join in sacred music by having them regularly play an instrument can improve their musicianship and build your music ministry community
- Sibelius and other music writing software will do the heavy lifting for you if you're using a transposing instrument I routinely did arrangements for oboe, clarinet, alto sax and English Horn (C, Bb, Eb and F instruments respectively) and Sibelius made it simple.
