## John Walker to be Honored

The American Guild of Organists (AGO) has selected internationally acclaimed organist and teacher **John Walker** as the honoree for the 2019 AGO Endowment Fund Distinguished Artist Award Recital and Gala Benefit Reception on **Friday**, **April 26**, **in Pittsburgh**. The public is invited to attend.

Purchase tickets online by April 12 at Agohq.org/2019-gala to attend.

The celebration begins at 7:30 p.m. with a free recital by John Walker at Shadyside Presbyterian Church, 5121 Westminster Place, where Dr. Walker previously served as minister of music (1992–2004).



His program will include Guilmant's stirring March on Handel's *Lift Up Your Heads*, Virgil Fox's transcription of Bach's *Come Sweet Death*, John Knowles Paine's virtuosic *Concert Variations on Old Hundredth*, and John Weaver's *Sine Nomine*, along with other selections.

The Gala Reception (advance tickets required) benefitting the AGO Endowment Fund will follow the recital at Mansions on Fifth, an elegant Gilded Age hotel, located just a few steps from the church. Guests will enjoy cocktails and hors d'oeuvres while mingling and visiting with John Walker.

The AGO Endowment Fund Distinguished Artist Award Recital and Gala travels around the country to celebrate distinguished members of the organ world, to raise awareness for the Endowment Fund, and to secure gifts to strengthen it. All proceeds from the 2019 Gala will honor John Walker in perpetuity. Annual earnings from the AGO Endowment support educational programs and outreach.



Founded in 1695, Christ Church, Philadelphia is often referred to as "the Nation's Church" for its central role in the Revolutionary era, having counted seven signers of the Declaration of Independence and such figures as Benjamin Franklin, Betsy Ross, John Penn, Francis Hopkinson, and George Washington among its members. In 2018 Christ Church dedicated the Esther Wideman Memorial Organ, C.B. Fisk's Opus 150, the first new pipe organ built for the space in almost 200 years. Consisting of 3 manuals, 49 stops, and 3,095 pipes, this uniquely designed instrument can be heard in weekly Sunday services and Wednesday demonstrations; monthly First Friday recitals and Evensongs, and on special occasions such as for this month's Tuesday Noon AGO series.

#### Dean



**Douglas J. Backman** is a lifetime AGO member, originally joining the Boston chapter during middle school and switching to Philadelphia during his freshman year at Drexel University. After receiving both bachelor's and master's degrees in communications and marketing, he is currently completing his dissertation for a doctorate in organizational development from Northeastern University. In the past decade of being a part of the Philly chapter, he has been associated with the EM Skinner at Girard College, Wanamaker Grand Court Organ, and music program at St. Charles Borromeo seminary. He is also known for being the live-in personal assistant of the late Michael Stairs between 2011-2016 and founding member of the Girard College Organ Guild. On September 23, 2018, Doug married his wife Brittany at Church of the Redeemer Bryn Mawr, in a musically lavish

service accompanied by the Philadelphia Brass, Main Line String Quartet, and 16 select members and soloists of the Church of the Redeemer choir, under the baton of Dr. Michael DiOrio.

#### Sub-Dean



Charles Grove serves as Organist and Choirmaster at Washington Memorial Chapel in Valley Forge where he leads a vibrant choral program in the Anglican Tradition. During the day he works as a synthetic chemist for a small biotech company in the Greater Philadelphia area. He can be seen photographing a variety of corporate events and musical ensembles throughout the region. Charles is a POE veteran having experience nearly a dozen as a student, instructor, chaperone, and coordinator. He is known for leading workshops on Anglican Chant for both AGO chapters and POEs, and looks forward to bringing his enthusiasm for life into the AGO leadership.

### **Secretary**



Maria Ellis has served as the chapter's secretary since 1999. She was born in The Netherlands, where her early music training was on the family harmonium. She followed this up much later, while a graduate student at Yale University, with several years of private lessons in organ from Paul Jordan and other New Haven area organists. From 1978-86 she was the organist/choir director at St. Andrews United Methodist Church in Llanerch and from 1986-2003 organist/choir-master at St. John the Evangelist's Episcopal Church in Lansdowne. Resigning from that position at the time her husband retired from teaching, she played for a number of area churches as an occasional substitute and also served several churches as long-term interim organist/choir director. At present she is the director of music at Lower Merion Baptist Church in Bryn Mawr. A member of the chapter since 1976,

she was the Registrar for the International Organ Playing Competition, part of the Third International Congress of Organists, held in Philadelphia in August 1977 under chapter sponsorship, and she coordinated registration activities for the 2002 National Convention. In addition to her musical activities, which also involve singing in various area choruses including the Bryn Mawr Renaissance Choir and the Wayne Oratorio Society, Dr. Ellis was for many years the Executive Director of the American Institute for Yemeni Studies and the pro-ject director of the Digital Library for International Research, a joint undertaking of twenty-three American overseas research centers including AIYS, before retiring from these positions in 2012.

#### Treasurer



Bruce Marshall has been a member of the Philadelphia Chapter of AGO since 1980, and previously completed four years as Treasurer for the Association of Church Musicians in Philadelphia (ACMP). This will be his fourth two-year term for AGO Philadelphia. He has served at several area Episcopal and Catholic parishes. Most recently, he was Minister of Music, organist, and choir director at St. Margaret Church in Narberth from 1989 until 2003, when he stepped down to do substitute organ work, which he continues to do. Also a member of the National Association of Pastoral Musicians (NPM), Bruce is a passionate student of the role of music in liturgy, having attended numerous NPM, St. Charles Seminary and AGO courses, workshops, and conventions. He volunteered at the Philadelphia NPM and AGO conventions, iincluding as coordinator of the Core Committees for the NPM Regional

here, and regularly volunteers at our January Jumpstarts. He strongly believes in the need for community among pastoral musicians for purposes of mutual support and encouragement, continuing education, and fellowship. His career as an Electrical Engineer and knowledge of Excel are attributes that have served him in this position.

#### **Executive Committee**



Jeremy Flood combines an avocation as an organist with his medical practice of endocrinology. He studied the organ in his hometown of Poughkeepsie, New York and as an undergraduate at Cornell University, where he served as the organist of the Episcopal Church at Cornell. In Philadelphia, he was the organist at St. Mary's Church Hamilton Village (the Episcopal Church at Penn) for three years and more recently has been active as a substitute organist for churches throughout the Philadelphia area. He has been an Assistant Wanamaker Grand Court Organist at Macy's since 2009 and has performed in Verizon Hall at the Kimmel Center and at Longwood Gardens. Jeremy is an Associate Professor of Clinical Medicine at the Perelman School of Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania. His clinical practice is based at Penn Presbyterian Medical Center, where he

is Chief of the Division of Endocrinology, Diabetes, and Metabolism. He is also a board member and past president of the Philadelphia Endocrine Society.



Ethel Geist started accompanying choir rehearsals while in junior high school, and has been involved in playing piano and/or organ, or directing choirs, or both ever since. Her "full-time job on the side" was teaching music, primarily junior and senior high, most recently for 15 years at Eastern Camden County Regional High School in Voorhees NJ. Previously, she spent 17 years teaching in Ohio, mostly in Columbus. Upon retiring from teaching, Ethel became the full-time church musician at Trinity Lutheran Church in Perkasie, PA, involving people from pre-school age to grandparents in their 80s and 90s in musical activities, in choirs, bell choirs, establishing a concert series, and following their varied interests in music. At Trinity she also worked with an organ committee charged with replacing an instrument that could no longer be repaired. In addition to church music, she acquired a hobby of learn-

ing concert repertoire, studying with Dennis Elwell. Ethel and her husband Norm, also a church musician, are involved in professional organizations, including serving as "co-deans" of the SouthWest Jersey chapter of AGO. Ethel was also dean of the Philadelphia Chapter in 2003 and 2004. She is also active in the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians and the Organ Historical Society. Erik Meyer, from Collingswood, NJ, began his organ studies with J. Bert Carlson, later earning his music degrees from the Peabody Conservatory of Music in Baltimore, studying with Donald Sutherland. He has performed over 100 Organ concerts throughout the US and Europe, as well as flute & organ recitals with his wife, Anna. He is music director at the Church of St. Martin-in-the-Fields, Philadelphia, and adjunct faculty at Temple University. He is the composer of the new Johns Hopkins University school song, and recently won composition awards from FredBrass, the Twin Cities AGO, Presbyterian Association of Musicians, and the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians. You might also see him on or off stage with the Collingswood Community Theater or Newtown Arts, playing trombone in the Jenkintown Community band, violin in the Abington Symphony, or on really bad days, accordion in his living room.



Bynum Petty, after completing his formal education concentrating on music history, established himself as a designer and producer of pipe organs in 1975. Doing business under the name Petty-Madden, his company designed, constructed, and installed organs coast to coast for more than thirty years. He retired from organ building in 2006 and established himself as an organ consultant for churches, universities, and individual organ building firms. Since 2010, Petty has been Librarian-Archivist of the Organ Historical Society, managing the world's largest research library devoted to the study of the pipe organ.

Möller Opus 7249, ca. 1946). Phil holds a B. Mus. and B.S. from Cairn University and his teachers include Eleanor Boyer, Samuel Hsu, Roy Brunner, Keith Chapman, David Ancker and Wesley Parrott. He has been involved with the Philadelphia Chapter since 1982 and, in

addition to the Executive Committee, has served on the Chapter's Program Committee, and on the Performances Committee for the 2002 National Convention in Philadelphia. He endeavors to promote networking between members of the Guild and helping raise the visibility and consciousness of the Chapter throughout the Delaware Valley.



Dan Weckerly started with private organ instruction at age 11 and was soon accompanying liturgy at his home parish, Sacred Heart, Manoa. As a student at Saint Joseph's University, while studying abroad, he played organs in London, Oxford and Canterbury. In 2015, he sang in the choir for the closing Mass of the World Meeting of Families, celebrated by Pope Francis, book-ending his participation in the 1979 Philadelphia Papal Mass of Pope John Paul II. He is now Music Director for the Reformed Church of the Ascension, UCC, Jeffersonville.

# Biography: Dr. John Walker

John Walker has performed in recital and as concerto soloist throughout North America, Europe, and Asia. He has performed three times at Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris, St. Paul's Cathedral in London, and other cathedrals and churches in Europe and the U.S. In Taiwan he has performed frequently at the National Concert Hall in Taipei and as soloist with the National Symphony Orchestra. He has appeared frequently with the San Francisco Symphony under the baton of Michael Tilson Thomas, notably as soloist in Lou Harrison's avantgarde Concerto for Organ with Percussion Orchestra.

"A lot of people can play the notes, but there's always something indefinable in John's playing," remarked Frederick Swann, past president of the AGO and Walker's predecessor at the Riverside Church in New York City. "It's playing that can reach out to people. John always understands the music he's performing. He seems to have a way of projecting the music that enables the people to know what the music is saying. He doesn't put himself out in front. The music always comes first."

A profound practitioner of the art of sacred music, John Walker is minister of music emeritus at Brown Memorial Park Avenue Presbyterian Church in Baltimore, following distinguished tenures at the Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, the Riverside Church in New York City, and First Methodist Church in Palo Alto, Calif.

Walker is the immediate past president of the American Guild of Organists (2014–2016). As president, he led the organization representing more than 15,000 members. He was vice president for six years and treasurer for four. In addition, he coordinated two regional conventions and was dean of the San Jose and New York City AGO chapters. He was the first director of the Task Force on the New Organist, which conceived and implemented the highly successful Pipe Organ Encounters program, now occurring annually throughout the U.S. and abroad.

A Fellow (FAGO) of the American Guild of Organists, Walker is professor of organ performance at Baltimore's Peabody Institute. Previous appointments include the music faculty of the Manhattan School of Music, where he was organ department chair; Duquesne University; Westminster College; and San Jose State University. He holds the doctor of musical arts degree from Stanford University as well as two master of music degrees cum laude from American Conservatory of Music in Chicago. In 1999 he was awarded a Fulbright Fellowship to teach and to perform in Taiwan. In 2015 he was visiting professor at the Shanghai Conservatory of Music, and in 2017 he adjudicated international competitions in organ performance in both Taipei and Shanghai, marking his seventeenth professional visit to Asia.

# AGO Awarded \$20,000 Grant

National Endowment for the Arts grant will support educational programs in 2019

The American Guild of Organists (AGO) has been awarded a \$20,000 Art Works grant by the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) to support educational programs and career development for organists and choral conductors in 2019. The Guild has received regular support from the NEA since 2005 totaling \$200,000. "It is an honor for the Guild to be recognized again by the NEA, the most prestigious

independent federal agency in the United States responsible for funding and promoting artistic excellence, creativity, and innovation," stated AGO Executive Director James Thomashower. "This Art Works grant covers the full breadth of the AGO's educational activities for current and prospective members as well as our programs of outreach to the public."

The AGO promotes lifelong learning opportunities ranging from Pipe Organ Encounters (POEs) for youth and adults to a professional certification program for organists and choral conductors. This summer, more than 100 participants are expected to attend POEs, which include a

POE Advanced and a POE Technical, while more than 100 people will improve their skills and opportunities for employment through the Professional Certification Program. Thousands of people will benefit from educational workshops and extraordi nary performances of organ and choral music at seven AGO Regional Conventions held from coast to coast this summer.

Art Works is the NEA's principal grant making program. In February, the Arts Endowment stated that it received 1,605 Art Works applications for this round of grant making, and will award 972 grants in this category totaling \$27 million. "The arts enhance our communities and our lives, and we look forward to seeing these projects take place throughout the country, giving Americans opportunities to learn, to create, to heal, and to celebrate," said Mary Anne Carter, acting chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts. "The NEA's funding sends a positive uplifting message to the entire organ community: our instrument and its music are vitally important to the American people," Thomashower added. "NEA grants

The Pipe Organ Encounter (POE) is an introduction to the pipe organ through instruction in organ playing, repertoire, history, design, and construction. These regional summer music camps for teenage participants provide private and group instruction in service playing and solo repertoire, opportunities to learn about the musical heritage of various religious denominations, and a chance for young musicians to meet others with similar interests. Piano or organ proficiency ranging from intermediate to advanced is required. Scholarship assistance is available.

POE Advanced (for ages 13–18) June 23–28 Houston, Tex.


The POE Advanced provides intermediate to advanced classes in areas such as organ literature, history, pipe organ construction and design, music theory, improvisation, conducting, and service playing for participants who have achieved a high level of success in organ study. Scholarship assistance is available.

**POE Technical** (for ages 16–23)
July 21–27 River Forest & Oak Park, III.

The POE Technical is a program designed for participants who are interested in learning the art and craft of organ building. The event is hosted in the workshop of an organ builder working in cooperation with a local AGO chapter. Scholarship assistance is available.

Generous funding from the Associated Pipe Organ Builders of America (APOBA), the American Institute of Organbuilders (AIO), the Jordan Organ Endowment, and the National Endowment for the Arts will support these summer educational programs from coast to coast and abroad. Scholarship assistance is provided by the AGO New Organist Fund.
